<u>According to the ASPCA</u>, female pets will live a much longer and healthier life if they are "fixed" compared to their non-spayed counterparts. <u>Feline spaying</u> helps to prevent cancer and reduces uterine infections. A decline in both of these diseases is reduced after spaying and for uterine infections, they drop by around 50% for canines and a whopping 90% in female cats.

#2 - COMMUNITY CONCERNS


Stray animals and their resulting unwanted offspring, offer some real concerns when it comes to our suburban and rural communities, especially when it comes to young families. These roaming animals often frighten young children, cause car accidents, and their resulting decaying and dead bodies give way to rising disease concerns and the ghastly sight of these tragedies can often traumatize kids as well as adults.
